COMMUNION

Like Baptism, the celebration of the Lord's Supper (also referred to as Holy Communion or the Eucharist) is properly celebrated within the worship assembly following the reading of Scripture and the preaching of the Word. The theological understanding of the Lord's Supper and its efficacy varies widely among us, nevertheless it is important to recall the saying of Richard Baxter, "Nowhere is God so near to man as in Jesus Christ: and nowhere is Christ so familiarly represented to us as in this holy sacrament." In the Lord's Supper we are reminded that we are part of the Lord's Body and "partakers of Divine Nature." Simple, everyday signs of bread broken and shared and cup poured and received signify a spiritual, and a concrete, participation in something far greater than what we see.

The administration of the sacrament may take different forms, depending upon local custom and circumstance. The most common manner of distribution among churches of our Way is by "passing." That is, the congregation remains seated and the elements are "passed" to them by the deacons. Another possible manner of distribution of the sacrament include the tradition of other bodies to come to the front of the sanctuary and receive the bread and then the cup (a common cup may be used, but it is only suggested if fermented wine is used - individual cups and spot for receiving them make this method very efficient). A variant on the preceding method is 'intinction,' where the recipients come forward take from a common loaf and then 'intinct' (dip) the bread in a common cup. The former method can be effectively used with non-fermented wine. Regardless of the manner of administration chosen, it is important that the reception of the sacrament be done thoughtfully and reverently. Also, it is important to note that the Words of Institution do not constitute a re-enactment of the Lord's Supper, so it is not appropriate to break the bread as the words are said. It is more appropriate, and more in line with Christian tradition, to break the bread during a 'fraction rite' immediately before it is to be distributed to the people.

Those who wish to follow the full 'four-fold' order of worship (the church gathers/the church hears the Word/the church offers the Great Thanksgiving/the church is sent forth to love and serve) will find abundant resources in The Book of Common Worship of the Presbyterian Church-USA and in The Book of Common Prayer. In those worship resources will be found full texts for prayers of confession and assurances of pardon, the Great Thanksgiving Prayers with their proper prefaces for various days and occasions, and appropriate prayers for after communion. What follows are some suggested Orders for the celebration of Holy Communion

The General Comfession (by minister and people)

Almighty and most merciful Father, we have erred and strayed from your ways like lost sheep. We have followed too much the devices and desires of our own hearts. We have offended against your holy laws. We have left undone those things which we ought to have done; and have done those things which we ought not to have done. But you, O Lord, have mercy upon us. Spare those, O God, who confess their faults to you. Restore those who are penitent; according to your promises declared unto us in Christ Jesus our Lord. And grant, O most merciful Father, for his sake, that we may hereafter live a godly, righteous, and sober life, to the glory of your holy name. Amen.

Assurance of God's Forgiveness (by the minister)

(Minister) After supper he took the cup and again gave God thanks and praise and said, 'This is the cup of the new testament in my blood: do this, as often as you drink it in remembrance of me. For as often as you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes again in glory.' Ministering to you in his name, I give you this cup.

Prayer of Thanksgiving (unison)

We give thanks to you, almighty God, that you have refreshed us with this memorial of your love, and have granted to us the presence of your Son, even Jesus Christ our Lord; and we ask you to strengthen our faith in you and to increase our love toward one another; through him who is our redeemer. Amen.

Invitation to Communion (by the Minister)

Beloved, as we draw near the Lord's table, we should consider our need to renew our comfort and strength as we make our earthly pilgrimage. We also remember that we should come to the Lord's table with knowledge, faith, repentance, and love; with hearts hungering and thirsting for God.

Therefore, you who are truly repentant of sin and are in love and charity with your neighbors, and intend to lead a new life, following the commandments of God, and walking from now on in his holy ways: draw near with faith and make your humble confession to Almighty God.

Prayer of confession(unison)

Most merciful God, we confess that we have sinned against you in thought, word and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We are truly sorry and we humbly repent. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your name. Amen.

Assurance of pardon (by the Minister)

Hear the Word of God to all who truly turn to him:

"If any one sins, we have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous; and He is the perfect offering for our sins, and not for ours only, but for the sins of the whole world." 1 John 2:1-2

May Almighty God have mercy upon us, forgive us all our sins, and deliver us from all evil; comfort and strengthen us in all goodness, and bring us all to everlasting life. Amen.

Prayer of Consecration

O Lord, who has consecrated for us a new and living Way, following Jesus Christ our Lord, grant to us who are gathered to receive from the one loaf and one cup that our hearts may be truly given over to the influence of the Spirit. And here we offer and present ourselves to you, O Lord, ourselves, our souls, and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice to you. Now, as we commemorate his last supper with his disciples, and his offering of himself in the sacrifice of the cross, we humbly ask you to grant your Holy Spirit, and to sanctify this bread and this wine, that they may become for us the body that was broken and the blood that was shed for us. May they foster within us penitent hearts and renewed faith, and may we receive this holy Sacrament to our comfort; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

because I invite you; it is our Lord. It is his will that those who want him should meet him here.

The Prayer of Thanksgiving (by the minister)

So, in the name of Christ and following his own example, we take this bread and this wine and give thanks to God. It is both our duty and our joy to bring you our thanks, as creator, redeemer and sustainer.

At the beginning of time you brought existence out of nothing, and gave it shape. You spoke, and life began. With your own hands you formed us from the dust and molded us in your image.

When we ignored your voice and discovered evil you never abandoned us but sent prophets to call us back to you; and finally, when we had persisted in sin, you sent your Son, our redeemer. He was born as one us; he shared our pain; healed our wounds; and taught us the truth. He welcomed the sinner, and touched the unclean; yet he was rejected and killed.

Death could not hold him and after three days he broke from the tomb and appeared to the women; though others would not believe them, the good news spread.

By the presence of the Spirit, still he is with us. He renews our lives, and makes us into one body. The hearts of his people are filled with faith, hope, and love. Now we can praise you with the whole church throughout the world and in every time as we celebrate this feast at your own table.

By the Spirit's presence we know Jesus' words to us to be true as we share his gifts and hear him say: This is my body. This is my blood of the new covenant.

As we eat and drink together we look to the past, as remember his living, dying and rising; we look to the present, as we celebrate his presence and declare that he is Lord of all; and we look to the future as we prepare for the day when we shall drink the wine new with him in his Father's kingdom.

And to him who is able to keep us from falling and to make us stand without blemish in his presence of his glory with rejoicing, to the only God our Savior, through Jesus Christ our Lord, be glory, majesty, power and authority, before all time and now and forever. Amen (Jude 24)

Gathering our prayers into one, we pray as Jesus taught us.

The Lord's Prayer

The Sharing of Bread and Wine

"The bread that we break, is it not a sharing in the body of Christ? Because there is one bread, we who are many are one body, for we all partake of one bread." (the bread is broken and distributed to the congregation. As all eat, these words may be used: The bread of heaven in Christ Jesus)

"The cup of blessing that we bless, is it not a sharing in the blood of Christ?" (the wine is distributed to the congregation. As all drink these words may be used: The cup of salvation in Christ Jesus.)

Thanks be to God for his gift beyond words. (II Corinthians 9:15)

Concluding Hymn

Blessing
